South Central Community Action: 2012 Service Highlights

The South Central Community Action Program (SCCAP) is a not for profit organization designed as the Community Action Agency for Monroe, Morgan, Owen, and Brown counties.

Since 1965, the purpose of SCCAP has been to reduce the extent and impact of poverty in this service area. SCCAP, as enabler:

- Provides support and opportunity for self-development efforts by the low-income community and its members
- Engages in advocacy and representation of the interests of the low-income community, while facilitating self-representation.
- Networks with public and private agencies concerned with improving the quality of human life.
- Demonstrates innovative and effective approaches for dealing with causes and effects of poverty.
- Operates state and federal programs designed to meet specific needs of low-income individuals and families.

SCCAP's mission is to provide opportunities for low-income citizens to move toward personal and economic independence.

In 2012, SCCAP served 8,335 low-income people in Brown, Monroe, Morgan and Owen counties.

2012 Service Highlights

Employment: The number and percentage of low-income participants in SCCAP employment initiatives who got a job or became self-employed:

- Participants who were unemployed and expected to obtain a job: 16
- Participants who obtained a job: 16
- Pct. of participants obtaining this outcome: 100%

- Participants expected to be employed and maintain job for at least 90 days: 176
- Participants employed and maintained a job for at least 90 days: 171
- Percentage of program participants achieving this outcome: 97%

Child and Family Development (Head Start): The number and percentage of infants children, youth, parents and other adults participating in developmental or enrichment programs who achieved program goals:

- Infants and children receiving immunizations, medical and dental care: 426
- Percentage achieving this outcome: 100%

- Infant and child health improved as a result of adequate nutrition: 437
- Percentage achieving this outcome: 100%

- Children participating in preschool activities to develop school readiness skills: 329
- Percentage achieving this outcome: 100%

- Children participating in preschool activities who are developmentally read to enter kindergarten or first grade: 216
- Percentage achieving this outcome: 100%

- Parents and other adults who learn and exhibit improved parenting skills: 346
- Percentage achieving this outcome: 100%

Energy Assistance, Housing and Other Services

- Non-emergency energy assistance: 3,692
- Non-emergency energy assistance for seniors and disabled: 2,595
- Emergency fuel or utility payments: 3,569
- Health care for seniors and disabled: 474
- Safe and affordable housing for seniors and disabled: 377
- Safe and affordable housing for others: 350
- Food assistance for seniors and disabled: 215

Volunteers

- Number of volunteers: 840
- Volunteer hours donated to agency: 14,021
- Volunteer hours donated by low-income individuals: 7,649
