South Central Community Action Program 2015 Summary of Results

The South Central Community Action Program is a not for profit organization serving Monroe, Morgan, Owen and Brown counties. Since 1965, its purpose has been to reduce the extent and impact of poverty in its service area.

SCCAP's mission is to provide opportunities for low-income citizens to move toward personal and economic independence. SCCAP administers Affordable Housing, Energy Assistance, Growing Opportunities job training, Head Start, Individual Development Accounts, Section 8 Housing Choice Voucher, Thriving Connections and Weatherization programs.

SCCAP provided services to 7,909 people in 3,843 households in 2015.

Head Start 2015 - By the Numbers

- 439 Children Served, 353 in Head Start and 86 in Early Head Start.
- 388 Families Served.
- 89% Average Monthly Enrollment.
- 91% of Children Met Income Eligibility Guidelines.
- 100% of Children Received Vision/Hearing Screenings.
- 80% of Children Received Dental Exams.
- 88% of Families Received Services for Health Education, Parenting Education, Legal Services, Crisis Services, Housing Assistance, Job Training or Adult Education.
- 45% of Families Involved in Family Goal Setting.
- 100% of Children Met or Exceeded Expectations for Kindergarten.
- 30% of Enrolled Children Advanced to Kindergarten.
- Zero findings in federal Health and Safety Review, and Comprehensive Services and School Readiness Review.

Class Observations

Observations were conducted in SCCAP Head Start classrooms using the Pre-K Classroom Assessment Scoring System (CLASS[®]). The CLASS[®] tool looks at three domains and ten dimensions of teacher-child interactions and measures those observed interactions on a seven point scale.
